Children wrote their names on small paper locomotives and pinned them to a colorful train painted on a panel of 4by 8-foot homasote. Children could also sit and play with trains on the rug in the children's play area. New activities for children included a bean bag toss game and the outdoor "Bubble Blast" where blowing bubbles was a hit. Tonya Largay and Julie Bruce did face painting for both children and adults.

Another new feature of this year's show was selling raffle tickets for train rides. Wiscasset, Waterville & Farmington Railway and the Sandy River & Rangeley Lakes Railroad donated passes for families to ride on their tourist railroads for free. Governor's Restaurant also donated two \$20 gift certificates.

Mike Reed brought one of his speeders (or rail car) and displayed it at the club's entrance. Larry Cannon sold excess inventory, and tickets were sold on the club's raffle layout. Terry King pulled names for door prizes once an hour during the event.

The three rooms of HO, G-gauge, and N-scale, were busy entertaining our guests. Terry King made educational signs for the HO

The Secretary's Report was approved as published in the newsletter.

As Station Master, Tom Coulombe reported that a layout in Kennebunk has been donated to the club and that Jerry Johnston, Paul Lodge, Terry King, Bob Willard, and Tom Coulombe will tear down the layout on Monday, August 20. Tom also noted that additional lighting has been installed in the helix area of the HO layout. There are plans to stain the ramp and the library stairs. The outside lighting needs to be checked to be sure all four corner lights are functioning properly. Sometimes there is only one light on at night. Additional volunteers are still needed to do mowing and general grounds keeping chores.

Club Librarian, Terry King, reported that Gordon Draper is scanning slides and their descriptions into the computer. Surplus books are being selected to take to the Concord, NH show on Sunday, August 19.

Tickets which have already been sold on the train set will be held and be eligible when the drawing happens in November. Sets of tickets for a family of four have been donated by Wiscasset, Waterville & Farmington and Sandy River & Rangeley Lakes Railroad and will be raffled at the Train Fest. Tom will bring the toys and rug for the children's play area as well as the homasote train board on which children will push-pin their names.

Dick Clark announced that his G-gauge outdoor Toot & Chug Railroad will be open on September 8 after the Greene Day Parade at about 9 a.m. He asked if the club's raffle layout could be made available for the event. He expects people to come between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Club member are invited.
