CHRISTMAS PARTY AT DECEMBER MEETING

The Great Falls Model Railroad Club Christmas Party meeting on December 21 began with a 15minute Power Point presentation of club activities from November through December. There was a brief business meeting highlighting upcoming events for the next year and outlining the clinics planned for the next six months. Kent Waterson has volunteered to make a presentation on XtrkCAD at the January 18 club meeting. Treasurer Owen Buck gave the Treasurer's report. November and December were profitable months for the club, thanks to the efforts of club members at the Topsham show and the ExTRAINaganza as well as sales at the Brewer show and the Surplus Inventory Sale at the club. If the club continues to be active and financially successful in 2018, he believes it will be possible to make the final payment on the mortgage within the next year.



An appeal was made for members to volunteer to contribute to the Utility Team's monthly payment for electricity or water and sewer bills. The electric bill is approximately \$150 monthly, and the water and sewerage fee is about \$30 a month. In order to keep club dues low, members who can afford more than the annual dues of \$30 are asked to pledge a payment to one of the two utilities. Sometimes two or three people or families will volunteer to share the cost of electricity for a month. By the end of the meeting, nearly one-third of the pledges had been made for next year's utility bills.





The club is again looking for someone to be our bottle redemption volunteer. The bottles usually need to be redeemed only once or twice a month. Chuck Bagley had volunteered for the position this fall, but because of health problems, he will be unable to continue helping in this way.

NEW DUES SYSTEM



CLINIC AT JANUARY CLUB MEETING XTrkCAD

Computer Aided Design (CAD) has been available for decades and is useful to the designer for increasing productivity, quality of the design, communication through documentation, and reuse of designs through databases of previous work. Traditional CAD programs such as AutoCAD have their uses to the model railroader; but when it comes to track layout design, they can be quite cumbersome, especially to a non-experienced user. With the goal of providing the benefits of a CAD system without the complexity, XTrkCAD was developed specifically for model railroaders and it meets those goals.

XTrkCAD was originally a commercial product written for LINUX, produced by Sillup Technologies of Ottawa, Canada. Later it became open source (i.e., "free") and is now available for the Windows and MAC operating systems as well. The term "open source" means that the source code that lies behind the application is publicly available and can be copied, modified and used however the user would please. Since its release into the public domain, the application has continued to be maintained, fixing bugs and adding new features. The development is very much currently active; a new release is in testing and will be available soon.

With XTrkCAD, the user draws with sections of track. Straight and curved sections are flex-track; and components such as turnouts, crossings, and cross-overs are simply "dragged and dropped" from an extensive library of manufacturers' components. These libraries continue to be maintained as well, and new products are added regularly.

With XTrkCAD, a simple 4'x8' plywood sheet oval layout with a few turnouts and sidings can be created in minutes. The design can be printed out full scale (1:1) and used as a template for laying track to build your dream layout.

XTrkCAD is not limited to just trackwork. The application can add multiple drawing layers, each with its own unique objects, such as benchwork, structures, scenery and wiring diagrams. On a completed layout, the user can actually "run trains" on the layout and evaluate how well the layout works for various operations and switching maneuvers. It's much easier to find these issues before track is laid than after. Online resources are available for help, and the user-supported community is very active in providing help for new users. The interface may be a bit challenging to a new user; but once you understand the basics, you are limited only by your imagination. It's free!

VICTORIAN CHRISTMS AT WW&F

The 17th annual Victorian Christmas at the Waterville, Wiscasset & Farmington Railway was held on both December 16 and 23 in spite of the weather. The Victorian Christmas is held every year in rain, snow, sleet, or sunshine. The

weather doesn't matter; the trains will always run.



To thank all the area people who support the WW&F, the Victorian Christmas gives free train rides for all, starting at the Sheepscot Station in Alna and going a mile and a half down the line to Alna Center, where passengers meet Santa and Mrs. Claus

and enjoy horse-drawn sleigh rides and activities for the younger children. Free cookies, cakes, cheeses, hot chocolate and coffee are served in the shop building across from the museum and gift shop at the Sheepscot Station. An operating G-scale model railroad set up by a friend of the WW&F in the shop building was also of great interest to this year's visitors.

On Saturday, December 16, the unofficial attendance at the Victorian Christmas was approximately 850 passengers. The day was cold and there was plenty of snow on the ground, which made for a perfect train ride to the station at Alna Center and for the sleigh ride and special children's activities and crafts. The cold and rainy weather on the second Saturday kept the attendance down to 225, with few riders in the afternoon as the weather deteriorated.

It takes many volunteers doing all sorts of chores and activities to make these days a success. A lot more preparation is needed in addition to the main event and includes preparing the trains and getting qualified volunteers for all the train positions as brakemen, firemen, engineers and conductors. Several Great Falls Model Railroad Club members regularly volunteer with the WW&F and most of them helped during this year's Victorian Christmas events.

On December 17, Dan Malkowski was the brakeman on steam locomotive #9, built by the Portland Company in 1891 and renovated by the WW&F over a period of almost ten years. At the Victorian Christmas on December 19, 2015, #9 was run for the first time in over 82 years. This year #9 made four round trips on December 17. The diesel locomotive #52 also made four round trips each day.

Nancy Weeks set up her food truck for those who wanted a light lunch. Jane and John Robertson greeted guests in the gift shop, where Joan Meehan worked. Bryce Weeks worked wherever he was needed. Joe Fox also helped with the trains, while his wife Dawn and their daughter Leanne enjoyed the day.

Bryce Weeks mentioned that one of his favorite memories from a previous Victorian Christmas was having both locomotives #9 and #10 running in 2015. Another special memory, although not from the Victorian Christmas, was the Photo Charter Specials in January last year. His favorite events, however, are the work weekends because they are always fun. Everyone is friendly, and members get to see friends they don't normally get to see the rest of the year.


Utility Team
