GFMRRC CELEBRATES AUBURN'S 150TH BIRTHDAY

On Friday, February 22, 2019, Auburn celebrated its 150th birthday as a city with over 30 "Cake Sites" throughout the city. In honor of Jake & Andy's Donut Shop, the original owners of our building, the Great Falls Model Railroad Club served donuts instead of cake. Auburn Mayor Jason Levesque, who presided at the Auburn City Hall cake-cutting ceremony at noon, toured the railroad club shortly after that and presented the club with a commemorative medallion.

Tizz Crowley, Auburn's Publicity Chairman for the birthday celebration, visited the railroad club the night before the event. She was given a tour of our facility and was enthusiastic about our layouts and railroad history displays. On Friday afternoon Tizz and her friend Migdalia Mass came to the railroad club dressed in attractive 1860's period costumes. During their visit to the HO layout, they were guests at the dedication ceremony in which Travis Johnson unveiled two HO locomotives he had painted and decaled in honor of Auburn's 150th birthday. Using Auburn's 150th Anniversary logo, Eric Long had created the decals that Travis used on the HO locomotives and the larger decals that Dick Clark used on a box car, refrigerator car, and caboose for the G-gauge layout.

More than thirty club members made this a successful event by doing whatever was needed. They created posters and displays, greeted visitors, helped with refreshments, gave tours, ran trains, supervised Guest Engineers on the HO layout, and talked with guests about real railroads and model railroading. Over 100 people attended, and about eighty percent of them were here for the first time.

Auburn officials had hoped that we could develop a history of railroads in Auburn, which we did with the help of Librarian Terry King and others. George Pitchard helped to find copies of old newspaper articles and pictures that dated back to the early days of Auburn's former railroad station. Three static displays included a replica of Maine Central steam locomotive #470, formerly owned by Wally Chase. Since the Interurban trolley was an important part of railroading in Auburn, Eric and Darin Long contributed an HO trolley. Bob Willard's friend Brian Inch loaned us an O-scale replica of the Flying Yankee, which regularly brought passengers from Boston to Auburn and Lewiston. One of our posters included three pictures of the Flying Yankee in Auburn during its initial demonstration run in February 1935. The pictures were enlarged from original photos taken by Frank Lodge, the uncle of club member Paul Lodge. Many visitors showed interest in the GFMRRC Memory Book created by Brenda Leslie and in the Hobo Holiday display, and some took the brochure explaining the hobo symbols used throughout the country.

Because our building was the home of Jake & Andy's Donut Shop for more than 50 years, we honored the previous owners by serving donuts instead of cake. Rolande and Roger Breton, who owned Jake & Andy's for over 25 years, provided us with several photographs which we displayed. For donuts similar to theirs, they recommended the Italian Bakery in Lewiston. The Italian Bakery's new owner, Brandon Leclair, generously matched our purchases by donating half of the 12 dozen donuts we bought.

MODELERS FORUM

Jay Wiley, a new club member and newcomer to the Forum, brought some projects he has been working on. Jay has been a model airplane builder for many years and has begun putting together a 4x8 model railroad layout to share with his three grandsons. One of his projects was a Walther's Coaling Tower, which he had modified with a working coal chute and gate.

The GFMRRC Modelers Forum meeting on Thursday, February 28, began in a different way than the usual format. Paul Lodge kicked off the meeting with a presentation on the events of the "Cake Site" Open House on Friday, February 22, which was part of the Auburn 150th Birthday Celebration. Paul shared displays of Auburn's railroad history and described the participation by club members and the reception by the public. He finished with a video of the day's events made by Dick Clark.

Kent Waterson explained the progress of his work on constructing a battleship catapult that will be used in a diorama. Parts for the catapult were cut on a Cricut Air 2 machine in 0.030" styrene, making for clean, uniform cuts. The base for the catapult was printed on a 3D printer and detailed with scrap parts, various steam locomotive piping parts, and bits of styrene and solder.

Bob Willard demonstrated a new tool he had purchased, a Proxon Power Sander. The sander comes with various shaped wands, stick-on sanding shapes (to match the wands) and grits. Although the sander makes a job easier, Bob noted that it will quickly take away too much material if the user is not careful. Bob also showed progress on some Railway Express trucks he has been producing. Last month he had demonstrated his process of laying out and cutting the pieces of 0.060" styrene, and this month he showed one of the completed cargo boxes. Bob is also working on a 1/43 1948 Ford Flathead with Ardun O.H.V conversion motor. This motor was originally developed to improve the power in trucks, but hotrodders also realized its potential and began using the motors in their hotrods. The motor is a Shapeways 3D-printed part that fit well into the '32 Ford 3-window coupe hotrod Bob is building.

Dexter Baum was up next with a variety of pieces. Dexter had experimented with trying to form round styrene tubing into a 90-degree angle. The piece he showed had multiple angle cuts and nicely formed the shape he was after.

The last few months at the Modeler's Forum, various members have brought collections of miscellaneous parts that could be used for flatcar loads. Paul Lodge had started the discussion, and Kent Waterson had brought some electronic components that were fabricated into loads. This month Dexter brought a large capacitor out of a radar unit that could be used for a load. In fact, he had seen in a magazine the same capacitor crated and transported on a flatcar. Various parts salvaged from an IBM Selectric typewriter ribbon cartridge and a spool from a lawn trimmer also made for interesting loads.

Dexter had recently purchased some Walther's Gas Station parts for use on his layout, and explained the card file inventory system he uses to keep track of his purchases. Dexter's cards work very well in his system for finding materials he has purchased and eliminates the "I know I have that part ... somewhere?"

Jay Wiley, a new club member and newcomer to the Forum, brought some projects he has been working on. Jay has been a model airplane builder for many years and has begun putting together a 4x8 model railroad layout to share with his three grandsons. One of his projects was a Walther's Coaling Tower, which he had modified with a working coal chute and gate. Jay shared numerous pictures he had found on the Internet providing information on adding the details. He also showed a small building produced by Structure Company that will be a part of his layout. His last item was an RS Laser-cut wagon kit. The HO kit has 37 pieces and makes a beautiful horse-drawn wagon. Jay used horses from a circus kit to pull the wagon.

The Forum welcomes everyone who enjoys modeling of any type to come and share their knowledge and experience, or just come to listen and learn.

A railroad video of Maine Central was shown from 6:30 to 7:00 p.m. while club members were arriving for the monthly meeting and enjoying snacks purchased by Rick James. The meeting room was set up for the City of Auburn's 150th Anniversary Cake Site. There were three tables of pictures, displays, and historic information about our club's building and railroads in Auburn. To illustrate the historic literature, club members had brought in replicas of the Maine Central 470, the Flying Yankee, and trolley cars.

Vice President Mike Meserve opened the meeting and asked for the Secretary's Report.

A motion was made and accepted to approve the Secretary's report as published in the *Signal*.

Terry King gave the Treasurer's Report for Owen Buck, who is away on one of his world-tour adventures. Terry reported that the sales at the Augusta show were good and that a final figure will be available later. The report was approved as given.

At a meeting several months ago, the Executive Committee approved the systematic replacement of fluorescent lights. The club is in the process of creating new corners for the traveling modular layout. A motion was made and approved to purchase a new rack to hold the new corners after they are completed.

The Power Point presentation included pictures from the recent Dollhouse and Model Train show in Augusta, Spikey's Station, Modelers Forum, work sessions of HO and G gauge crews, and an HO Operating Session.

Travis Johnson explained the video project currently under way. The project is an attempt to help members (and non-members) learn how to run the equipment on our extensive HO Division layout.



G-GAUGE UPDATE

The G-Gauge goals for the work session on Saturday, February 9, were to complete and check the wiring of our upgraded layout. This included plans to finish and check out the wiring in the Middleton Yard and the Service Yard. The crew also hoped to install and complete the wiring for a new wye switch and to check out its operation. We are looking forward to scheduling our FIRST Operating Session soon, perhaps after our next work session, which is scheduled for March 9.

Many of these ambitious goals were achieved during the work session. In Ken Nettleship's words, "This was a great group effort...and a tremendous undertaking by a great group of guys."

Wiring and checking out the Middleton Yard is now nearly complete. With one more set of wires and its corresponding control switch, the entire yard will be operational. We also want to add a hidden power switch to ensure that only trained personnel will be able to operate the Yard and its neighboring Reversing Wye. There is probably an hour's work left on this project.

The Service Yard is fully operational! All we have to do is replace a temporary power hookup with a more permanent set up. This will probably require less than 30 minutes.

The new Reversing Wye switch is completely installed and operational. It was a "thing of beauty" watching the first engine pass through and reverse direction without any electrical hiccup!

We need to install the remaining Yard Markers and Industry Signage. John Middleton has the signs that Dick Cosgrove printed on his 3D printer. This will allow him to add the industry descriptors. The signs represent the businesses that will receive and ship goods during "operating sessions".

One of Dick Clark's major tasks for the day was installing the engine yard switches inside the caboose. His photos from the work session showed the completed installation of the switch station for the engine house, and he noted, "The engine house had its lights turned on today as well. The mechanics do not have to work in the dark anymore." Ed Leslie had brought the engine house to the club house a few years ago after his wife Brenda built it. Great job, Brenda! It's a great addition to the G-Gauge layout.

Dick Clark, John Middleton, and Ken Nettleship operated the layout during the February 22 Open House celebrating Auburn's 150th Birthday and enjoyed watching all the smiling faces. John Middleton had temporarily mounted the clever industry signs,
