PARADE LOCOMOTIVE IN MEMORIAL DAY PARADE

On May 27 the Great Falls Model Railroad Club will participate in Auburn's Sesquicentennial Memorial Day Parade, which begins at 10:00 a.m. The theme for the parade is "Celebrating Auburn's Heritage, History & Honor." Our Parade Locomotive, which looks like a replica of a Civil War era steam engine, is perfect for the 150th anniversary of Auburn.

The parade route is about a mile and a half long, beginning on Riverside Drive near Rolly's Diner in New Auburn and ending at Railroad Park on Lincoln Street in Lewiston. There will be a post-parade ceremony at the Veterans' Memorial Park on Lewiston's Main Street side of the bridge. Before the Veterans' Memorial Park ceremony, our Parade Locomotive will return with other "non-participating parade units" to the Riverside Drive staging area and then come back to the railroad club.

The club is looking for at least four volunteers to carry the club banner and push the locomotive. Some repairs need to be made to the locomotive. As soon as space is available at the club, the locomotive will be brought in and made ready to go, including appropriate decorations. Auburn's 150th guidelines state, "All participants must prominently display patriotic style decorations to meet the parade purpose." Although the parade begins at 10 a.m., the floats and other units will need to be at the Parade Staging Area at the Auburn Rollodrome much earlier.

Having the Parade Locomotive available for events like this helps to bring attention to the club and make our in-house events more successful.





2019 SPRING TRAIN SHOW AT MT. ARARAT HIGH SCHOOL

The rental truck for transporting modules and surplus inventory sale items to the show was loaded at the club on Friday afternoon and driven to Topsham in time to unload and begin setting up modules for the Saturday show. On Saturday morning, the set-up was finished and trains were running when the doors opened at 10 o'clock.

The Great Falls Model Railroad Club set up its modular layout in the large lobby near the gymnasium to prevent our DCC system from interfering electronically with other layouts that also use DCC systems. Of the 300 people who attended the show, about 200 people came to view the club's layout

Food service was provided by the Mt. Ararat Sports Booster Club, and they were busy from before the show until shortly after noon.

About twenty-five club members attended or worked at the train show sponsored by the Great Falls Model Railroad Club at Mt. Ararat High School in Topsham on Saturday, April 27, 2019. Members helped by unloading tables from the delivery truck on Friday afternoon and setting up the tables and modules. Others helped by finishing the HO modular setup on Saturday morning, operating trains during the day, and tearing the layout down on Saturday afternoon. A particularly profitable part of the show was the sale of surplus assets, thanks to those who set up and sold the items and carefully packed the remaining stock after the show. Over 80 vendors had also rented sales tables. Terry Obie, who sold tickets at the door, counted about 300 men, women, and children in attendance.

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

Before the meeting began, a video of the train wreck in West Paris was shown. Club members discussed the operation as they watched. The video

was followed up with the monthly Power Point presentation showing club activities since last month.

Vice-President Mike Meserve opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance.

A motion was made and accepted to approve the Secretary's report as published in the *Signal*.

Terry King presented two new books purchased for the library and asked for additional suggestions from the members. The two books were *Chama & Cumbres* and *Interurban without Wires*. The Surplus Inventory Sale to be held on May 18 was mentioned. Terry reported that he will also have an "O-Scale only" sale on Saturday, June 8.

Owen Buck gave the Treasurer's Report and noted that all debts have been paid. The report was approved as given.

The HO Division reminded members that the operating session for April 20 is for Union Pacific locomotives and the railroads purchased by Union Pacific. The N-Scale Division is working to upgrade track. Eric Long reported that three locomotives with sound have been purchased for the layout.

There was a discussion about the recent donation of O-gauge trains and buildings from former club member Richard Proctor. The large donation provides all the material necessary (including benchwork) to build a layout. George Pitchard volunteered to construct an O-gauge layout in the area between the lunch counter and the Company Store. It would be six feet wide and 23 feet long and would be able to display a number of outstanding structures. A motion was made and accepted to build the layout as it was explained during the meeting.

Eric Long described a problem with the roof over the exit from the Company Store. It was noted that the roof needs to be the top priority before any other potential projects are started. After the explanation, a motion was made and accepted to fix the roof with a \$2,000 limit. If more money is needed, the Executive Board will need to approve it.

Dick Rubin came to the Saturday G-gauge gathering on Saturday, April 13. He wants to donate the "Best in Show" Maine Central train from the West Springfield show a few years ago. He asked that it be a static display for the club. Even though the train is G-Gauge, it represented the Great Falls Model Railroad Club at West Springfield. He felt the train should be a showpiece for

the club, along with the "Best in Show" award which the club won at that time. A motion was made and accepted to create a static display of the train above the doors along the north side of the meeting room, extending approximately thirty feet towards the N-scale room. Dick Rubin pledged to pay the cost of building the display.

Travis Johnson gave the Nominating Committee's report for club officers for the coming year. They are as follows: President, Mike Meserve; Vice President, Jamie Robinson; Secretary, Paul Lodge; Treasurer, Owen Buck; Librarian/Archivist, Terry King and George Pitchard (vote for one). Three directors will be elected from the following group of nominees: Roger Allen, Rick James, Darin Long, and Eric Long. Additional nominations can be made at the Annual Meeting in May when the officers are elected.

The floor refinishing project will be held off until the roof repairs are completed.

Paul Lodge reported that it was decided that the Executive Committee will not meet again until August 8.

When asked how many club members would like to visit the Seashore Trolley Museum as a group, about fifteen members raised their hands. Paul Lodge will contact John Middleton to see if arrangements can be made. John is a Great Falls Model Railroad Club member and Seashore Trolley Museum volunteer.

Rick James won the attendance prize and chose a series of Train Videos. Chuck Bagley won the 50/50 raffle.

Tom McAvoy was applauded for the work he is doing with the bottle returns. Considering that he drives in from Sidney, he is honoring a long-distance commitment.

Owen Buck gave the program for the evening with pictures from his recent trip to India. He included pictures from the railroad he rode on and video of his cab ride during his journey.

The meeting adjourned and the members enjoyed snacks.
