Presentations:

NMRA National Convention in Salt Lake City by Tage Erickson

Tage will present his experiences from his trip to the NMRA National Convention.

Developing a Rolling Stock Roster by Larry Cannon, MMR

Larry Cannon's clinic explores planning a freight car roster that supports a layout with 260+ car spotting locations and creating the information to plug into a mathematical matrix to test if the car fleet will satisfy basic operating needs of the layout. It includes planning for cars needed to be in route or in staging and an explanation of train assembly/switch lists utilized for operations.

Alternative Structures for the Railroad by Bob Bennett

Bob Bennett is approaching the final stages of construction on his On30 South China and Sheepscot River Railroad, but that doesn't mean that he has to stop scratch building outstanding structures. Bob will demonstrate how he continues to build a number of Maine-based flagstop stations and water tanks and swaps them out with existing structures on his layout. Many of his structures have been featured in magazines and you may recognize them. Bob will bring in many samples of his work and mock-ups of locations on his layout to demonstrate his technique.

Pulp and Paper Mill Car Fleets by Dr. Jack Lutz

At the Seacoast Division's 2019 Winter Meeting, Chuck Hastings presented "Modeling a Paper Mill"; where he discussed pulp and paper mill operations and the types of railroad cars that bring materials in and out of those mills. In this presentation, Jack uses published reports and data to estimate how many cars of each type would arrive at or leave a mill in a week (or a year). His research and analysis indicate he needs to add a few more tank cars and several modern high-capacity covered hoppers to his car fleet.

Two You Tube railroad-related videos were shown for the first forty minutes.

The videos were followed with the monthly Power Point presentation showing club activities since last month.

President Mike Meserve opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance.

A motion was made and accepted to approve the Secretary's report as published in the *Signal*. The Executive Committee report from June 13 was read by Paul Lodge.

Owen Buck gave a brief Treasurer's Report and reminded members that the detailed report is posted on the bulletin board.

George Pitchard gave the Library Report. He noted that Tom Hastings has made a large contribution of about eighty books and half of them will be added to our library.

Bob Willard reported for the Modelers Forum and invited members to attend the gatherings on the fourth Thursday of each month. Bob announced that the club will be sponsoring a "Square Foot Contest." (An article in the newsletter will give more details about the "Square Foot Contest.")

Darin Long reported that work on the HO layout includes improving track and switches and removing excess ballast. Jamie Robinson was applauded for the work he is doing on the layout.

Eric Long said that track work is being done on the N-scale layout and that new lighting is being planned so that the layout can be viewed better.

George Pitchard is building a new O-Gauge layout in what was the conference room area. Thanks to an outstanding donation made by club member Dick Proctor, the club has more than enough building materials and model equipment to make an outstanding layout. A little more than 30 linear feet of skirting material needs to be acquired to dress up the layout when it is completed. One member noted that Walmart is having a fabric sale.

Because several large dying trees are close to the building and parking lot, it was suggested that they be removed. Carl Butland was authorized to contact Webster Tree Service to get a quote for their removal.

Carl Butland said that the driveway sand will be removed this week.

Paul Lodge distributed a sign-up sheet for those interested in going to the Seashore Trolley Museum on Saturday. (The final count was that about thirty people will be going, including about ten children.)

It was announced that the club picnic will be revived again this year. Paul and Frances Lodge will host it at their

home in West Minot on Saturday, August 24, from 10 a.m. until late afternoon. (More details are included elsewhere in this newsletter.)

There was a discussion about changing the monthly meetings from Thursday evenings to Saturday afternoons, immediately after the HO Operating Session ends at noon. All members were contacted by email about the potential change and encouraged to respond with their opinions. Over 20 members have replied, and the majority were in favor of the change. The topic will also be discussed at the club meeting on July 18.

At the end of the meeting, the winners for the Attendance Prize and 50/50 raffle were drawn. Sandy Sondheim won the Attendance Prize and selected a set of DVDs about American Railroads. Jamie Robinson won the 50/50 raffle.





Because the Ice Storm of 1998 damaged many trees, a portion of the land was cleared and converted to flower gardens, which are near the picnic area. Bog Brook is within a short walking distance. It is ideal for children to wade in because it is only about two feet deep. Anyone who will be wading should wear old sneakers as there are many small rocks.

Many current club members will remember operating HO trains on the Pine Tree Lines upstairs in the barn several years ago. The unique multi-level mushroom layout is only partially operational because of a recent squirrel invasion. Guests may still enjoy visiting the layout, but it is not handicapped accessible.

It is suggested that members bring their own lawn chairs and any picnic food they wish to eat or share during the afternoon.

There are four yards that originate trains and two small staging yards. The layout is NCE DCC. In addition to the home road, MEC, CN/CV, D&H and CP trains operate on the layout. The geographic territory extends from Richford, VT South to Wells River, VT and from Rouses Point, NY East to Whitefield, NH. The period modeled is 1980 into the 1990's.
