MAY 19 MEETING MINUTES

Paul Lodge — Secretary

President Mike Meserve opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Topics covered in last month's meeting were reviewed and a motion was made and accepted to approve the minutes as reviewed.

Owen Buck gave the Treasurer's Report which was approved as given. He noted that we earned a little more than \$600 on the Westbrook show. Thanks were given to those who paid for table rentals so that all the money collected could go to the club. It was observed that club flyers were not taken to the show. A suggestion was made that a list of items should be developed as a reminder of things helpful and necessary.

Rick James reported that Josh Stephens has uploaded many of the slides from our collection, but had to stop because he reached the free limit total. After a fee is paid, additional slides will be uploaded. Jamie Robinson noted that he plans to pay the fee, but needs the club's credit card to pay for it, and will then reimburse the club. [**Note:** this has been done].

The large collection of books donated by Don Damour is still in the process of being catalogued and entered into our computer by Jamie Robinson. It is his objective to have all the books catalogued by the next meeting. Once all the books have been entered into our computer, decisions will need to be made about which books to keep and which to sell.

MAY 19 MEETING MINUTES (CONTINUED)

It was suggested that an auction could be set up so that club members could have first choice on the duplicate books and those which do not fit into our geographic location interest. It was observed that books lose value if a library insert is added to the books. Therefore, if there are any duplicate books, we should retain the one we already have in our library and sell or donate the duplicate. Larry Cannon has suggested that any books we cannot sell could be donated to the NMRA library.

Bob Willard reported that the Modelers Forum will meet on the fourth Thursday as usual. Members were encouraged to bring projects on which they are currently working to share with others.

The HO Division reported that a major upgrade on the main line is being undertaken, but trains can still be run for operating sessions. The N-scale layout is operational. Training is necessary so that club members can turn the system on and run trains to show visitors.

It was reported that a group of Amherst club members visited our club and participated in an operating session. They had a good time and were impressed with our facility, especially the library.

It was noted that we are running out of storage areas for some necessary items. It was suggested that we eliminate some of the HO modules in our storage room in order to make room to store other club items. Since we now have our club's permanent layouts, we do not need to be a modular club. It was noted that they were popular at the Oxford County Fair last year, but we still have alternatives with small layouts as displays.

John Middleton's G-gauge switching layout needs to be available for the Seashore Trolley Museum in Kennebunk once a year. It is currently being housed in our meeting room and rental portion of our building. Jamie Robinson said that he has a contact person at the museum and perhaps they can make arrangement to have it permanently housed in the new building they are constructing for a layout which was donated to them.

We have traditionally participated in the Concord Train show in New Hampshire. This year it will be held on Sunday, August 14. Larry Cannon and others have usually attended the show and sold club's surplus assets. Normally the Concord Show is on the same weekend as the Lewiston/Auburn Balloon Festival. This year, however, the Balloon Festival is August 19 through 21, so we should be able to have members available to help out at the Concord show. Tables for the Concord Show are \$40 each and we usually rent three tables.

Carl Butland has moved to Buffalo and is not available to mow the lawn. It is believed that he took off the plow and attached the mower to the tractor before he left. Adam Long volunteered to do the mowing this year.

The next order of business was the election of officers for the next year. The following were elected by the members:

To finish the meeting the Attendance Prize was drawn. Adam Long was the winner and he selected one of the hats. Jamie Robinson won the 50/50 raffle and donated his portion to the club.

The meeting adjourned.

Modeler's Forum April 28 by Jamie Robinson



The modeler's forum gathered at the Great Falls Model Railroad Club at 7 p.m. on Thursday, April 28, 2022. In attendance were Bob Willard, Roger Plummer, Paul Lodge, Dick Holman, Rick James, John McMullen, and Jamie Robinson.


Bob kicked off the program with an On30 Box Motor with a body that he had scratchbuilt from styrene. The body was made to fit onto an HO scale switcher chassis. Bob used several layers of styrene to get the proper look for the window and doors.




He followed that with an On30 open trolley that was built to operate on a Bachmann HO trolley mechanism. Bob had cut down a "Christmas Trolley" and scratchbuilt a frame for it.



Roger Plummer was next in the line-up with some highly modified Norscot model truck tractors and trailers. Roger has added extra axles to some of the tractors and trailers, as well as making the axles fully equalized so that the model's wheels will all sit on the ground in a scene. This sort of work increases realism tremendously, even though adding axles requires the sacrifice of an additional truck tractor or trailer for the project. BTW – if you have any extra Norscot trucks, Roger is always looking for donor vehicles...

Roger went on to display some of the slot cars he uses. Roger races at several local tracks including Minot Mountain Speedway in Minot



and Fast Laps Raceway in Biddeford.

Paul Lodge brought his dead tree collection. The trees are scavenged ragweed roots that have been dried out. When suitably pruned, they make splendid dead trees. Paul also has initiated a raffle of \$25 gift cars to Governor's Restaurant. For a measly \$5, you could win a \$25 gift card! When 10 tickets are sold, the winner of the card will be drawn. From the \$50 collected, \$25 goes to the club, and \$25 pays for the card. Win-Win!



John McMullen showed two buildings he has been working on. One is a school, complete with a playground and school bus, the other is a fire-house and accompanying fire engine. John made some modifications to the firehouse by bricking up a window in the building and a couple in the hose tower.



Jamie brought in a reference to a comprehensive on-line magazine index about railroading, real and model. If you are looking for research material, try heading to over to https://rrmagazineindex.org/. This index will identify magazines where the information you are searching for can be found. Please note that it will only identify the magazine title, year and month of publication, it does not include the information itself because of copyrights. A quick search for "44 tonner" as an example yielded 1,469 results in 30 magazines. Once you have located the magazine(s) you want, we may well have them in our library, or have

access to the specified article online (if it is a Kalmbach publication).

Jamie also brought in a sample set of spudgers. If you have ever tried to pry the cover off a watch or mobile phone, the tool you are looking for is called a spudger. Spudgers are designed to pry covers off and are far safer than using a jeweler's screwdriver or steak knife... The set Jamie brought came in a handy carrying case, included several pairs of tweezers and cost less than \$15.



Dick Holman presented a couple of gondolas he had worked up to carry panel track. The panels were made from scrap flex track sprayed with rail brown. Dick fitted the gondola sides with u-bolts to hold tie-down chains. The u-bolts are from Cal Scale, while the fine chain is A-Line (27 links per inch). Dick also showed a pair of tweezers he uses to handle those pesky u-bolts. The tweezer tips are lightly coated with Goo, then allowed to dry. Once dry, they hold right onto the u-bolts. Presto! No more u-bolts launched into the stratosphere.

NEW FUNDRAISING STRATEGY APPROVED

At the April 21 monthly meeting of the Great Falls Model Railroad Club, Paul Lodge presented a fundraising idea based on Dick Clark's new connection with Governor's Restaurant in Lewiston. Dick Clark has agreed to help keep the restaurant's G-gauge train set operational by fixing and cleaning trains and track as needed. (For more details, see the article elsewhere in this newsletter.) Carlene Barnies, the restaurant manager, offered to pay Dick with gift certificates for meals at Governor's. As a result, Dick has more gift certificates than he can use. Paul Lodge suggested buying the certificates from Dick to use as a fundraising raffle to benefit the club.

Club members approved the idea at the April monthly club meeting. Each raffle will be a limited raffle, with ten tickets sold at \$5 apiece, making a total of \$50: Twenty-five dollars covers the cost of the gift certificate and the additional \$25 will go to the club. Winners of the gift certificates can enjoy a great meal and support the club at the same time.

GOVERNOR'S RESTAURANT AND DICK CLARK CONNECTION

Governor's Restaurant in Lewiston has been a supporter of the Great Falls Model Railroad Club for several years. They have regularly given out GFMRRC flyers and free passes to their patrons for our special events and open houses and have donated dozens of cookies for our events. For more than five years Paul Lodge and other members of the club took Brio sets and small interactive model railroad layouts to the restaurant on their Family Nights, the first Thursday of each month. These activities were suspended during the COVID epidemic.

Governor's Restaurant is noted for their G-gauge railroad running on tracks near the ceiling. While Paul and Frances Lodge were having a meal there in March, four different employees asked if the Great Falls Model Railroad Club could fix their G-gauge train and clean the track. While at the restaurant, Dick examined the track and noticed that some of the rail joiners were not making a good connection. He installed better connectors along one wall until he ran out of connectors. The train ran better on that portion of the loop, which made a noticeable difference. Dick said he would come back to the restaurant after he purchased more supplies.

Manager Barnies asked Dick if he would be willing to help keep the train in good operating condition, and Dick agreed to be the contact person for that.
